FROM OUR RABBI

COMMUNITY CALLS

A story is told of a young man whose family belonged to a synagogue. This young man grew up as part of the synagogue, participating in services with his parents, attending religious school, and sharing in holiday and life cycle celebrations with the community. But as he grew older, he realized that he was rather shy. He was embarrassed to ask questions or participate in discussions with other congregants, so he started studying about Judaism on the Internet. He also was self-conscious of his singing voice, so he began praying by himself rather than going to services. He wanted to continue living a Jewish life and believed he could still have a deep relationship with God by studying and praying on his own. He thought he just didn't need the synagogue anymore. So he finally decided not to renew his membership. After making this decision, he went to the Rabbi and explained that he would not be sending in his membership form this year.

The Rabbi, without saying a word, walked over to the fireplace where a mound of coals was burning, giving off intense heat and light. She moved one of the coals apart from the mound so that it was off to the side by itself. The Rabbi and this young man watched in silence as the singular coal got colder and colder, blacker and blacker. When the red heat of the coal was just about to go out for good, the Rabbi pushed the coal back toward the others. After just a moment, it ignited into a bright flame. The young man didn't say a word. But the following week, he mailed his membership form to the synagogue office.

Rabbi Hillel said: "*Al tifrosh min ha-tzibur* – do not separate yourself from the community." Like those coals that burn only when they are in a group, we need each other. No matter the quality of our singing voice, no matter how hard it is to ask a question or to smile and shake hands with someone new, we are better, stronger, and more fulfilled as a community than we are alone.

During these ten days when we are asked to look within ourselves, to reflect on our own shortcomings and make promises to improve ourselves, I ask you to look not within but without. I ask you to look at this congregation and all we can do together, and I ask you to renew your own commitment to be part of this community. I ask you to consider all the sacred tasks that must be done for a congregation to survive and to thrive, and renew *your* commitment to be part of it. Here at Temple Etz Rimon, there is so much work to be done, and there are so many ways to get involved. The possibilities are endless, and the rewards are infinite. Here are just a few suggestions:



Services—participate by reading, leading a prayer, or lighting candles. Offer a ride to someone who cannot drive at night. Sit close to the front, sing out loud, hold someone's hand, sit next to someone who came alone.

Oneg Shabbat/Kiddush—sponsor one in honor of a loved one or special event.

Camp Pomegranate—help by bringing snack or helping at a holiday celebration.

Leadership—serve on the Board of Directors or on a committee.

Sisterhood—join the women who support the congregation and each other.

Facilities—help put up the curtain and prepare the sanctuary for services.

The Pomegranate—write an article or volunteer to be the newsletter editor.

Caring Committee—provide a meal, send a card, or make a phone call to someone who is sick or lonely.

Lifelong Learning—host a class at your home.

Holidays—help plan a holiday celebration, help build the sukkah, bake holiday food.

Membership—tell your friends who do not yet belong what a wonderful congregation we have!

While we need help with all of these tasks, a few are especially critical at this time:

The Pomegranate—We especially need a new editor for The Pomegranate if we plan to continue this publication after next month.

Oneg Shabbat and Kiddush—We especially need someone to coordinate the Oneg Shabbat and Kiddush schedule if we plan to continue offering these opportunities for socializing after services.

Facilities—We especially need help preparing the sanctuary if we plan to continue using it for our worship.

REJOICE IN THE TORAH WITH CANTOR BARD

The last of the seemingly endless series of fall holidays, Simchat Torah celebrates the end of the annual cycle of weekly Torah readings and the beginning of the new cycle. Each year on the 23rd day of the Hebrew month of Tishrei we read the last section of the book of Deuteronomy when Adonai shows Moses the land being given to the Israelites, but does not let him cross the River Jordan to enter the Promised Land. We then unroll the entire Torah scroll, dance and celebrate in the word of Adonai, roll the scroll to the other end and start again at the beginning with the story of creation.



This year we will celebrate Simchat Torah on **Saturday morning, October 22**. Rabbi Sherman will be joined on the pulpit by **Cantor Deborah Bard**. Cantor Bard comes to us as Cantor Emerita of the historic K.A.M. Isaiah Israel Congregation in Chicago. Her “sparkling exuberant” voice is enhanced by her firm belief that music has the singular power to transcend the spoken word, to uplift the soul, to inspire prayer, to direct us to the Sacred.

Please join us in welcoming Cantor Bard to our community. She will be with us several times for Shabbat and holidays throughout the year.

FROM THE PRESIDENT

It has been a very busy couple of months. Even though the High Holidays come every year, and involve the same things every year, there is still a huge amount of work that needs to be done each and every time they roll around.

The process actually began sometime in April or May, when Rabbi Sherman and Lizz and I sat down and looked at the calendar for the entire upcoming year. We set dates for each Shabbat service, holiday celebration, Camp Pomegranate session, and as many other events as we could determine in advance. We took into consideration the Jewish calendar, the Pilgrim Church calendar, the Interfaith Shelter calendar, and five different school district calendars. Then the real work began.

The contents of the Big White Envelope were developed—old forms updated, new forms designed (this year we added a Sisterhood membership form and a Havurah interest form), decisions made, calendars ordered (oops, we forgot to add the website, we'll get that right next time)—and printed and stuffed and labeled and mailed. The list sounds short but each piece of paper you received was revised, reviewed, and revised again (and possibly again after that) before being approved and included.

Etz Rimon is slowly committing to institutional memory the things that for all this time have just been in people's brains. Where do we buy the special candles we need for our beautiful candlesticks? Who is responsible for polishing the candlesticks? What is in the storage unit? Who has keys to it and knows where it is and can retrieve what we need and return the items when we're finished using them? Where do we order the flowers for the bima? Do they deliver or do we need to arrange for pick-up? Who is our contact regarding the parking at the LDS church? How can we make sure the gates are open? Where do we buy our liability insurance? What are the limits? Who do we use for security and to ensure the Pilgrim parking lot is available for handicapped drivers? Who makes all these arrangements?

But, until the institutional memory is as detailed as we need it to be, someone, or a team of someones, has to think of all these things and many more each year. And that's just for the High Holidays.

All these things take time, not even including the hours of discussion necessary so the Temple is not an autocracy but is instead run by its members. As a result, I often find myself in a position where it is easier and less time-consuming to do things myself than it is to find someone else and explain what needs to be done and then supervise closely enough that things are done properly but not so closely that people feel micromanaged.

We are still having difficulties populating our various committees so most of their functions are performed by the committee chair or left to the Board as a whole. We do not have a Membership Chair, much less a committee, so I have been fielding membership calls and e-mails from prospective members in addition to any calls from current members with concerns and accommodation requests. We also do not have a Programs Chair. As it stands right now, each Board member has been asked to select a holiday for which they are willing to develop and coordinate a program—in addition to their primary Board commitment. Avi Rossenfeld organized a wonderful Ice Cream Social for S'lichot (thank you Avi) and I am in charge of our annual Pizza in the Hut.

In addition, I have been editing and writing a substantial part of *The Pomegranate* for all but a few months of the last four years, and for the last six months or so I have also done all the formatting and graphics work. I have been asking for someone else to take over the editing of the newsletter for several months now. Although there was one person who was briefly interested, no one has come forward to take over. So, unless someone else steps up, I am sad to report that the next issue will be the last.

We have also recently lost our Oneg Coordinator and have had no response to repeated requests for a replacement. We have someone who is willing to keep the supplies stocked and someone who is willing to "make a few phone calls," but no one has come forward to be the go-to person who will keep the calendar and send the reminders and follow-up to ensure that there is someone at services each week to at least bring challah and pour wine and, of course, clean up and leave the Pilgrim space in the proper condition. For the last month, I have stepped in and either provided the Oneg Shabbat or Kiddush myself or made sure someone else was there to take care of things, but I cannot continue to do this. Unless this vital position is filled very soon, we will no longer be able to have a bite to eat together after services.

It has always been important to the Etz Rimon community that membership costs remain low and that we live within our means. In keeping with this philosophy members have volunteered to perform the functions for which synagogues with higher dues pay professionals. If we want to continue this co-op management style, more of our members need to make the commitment to take an active part in our community. We need to not just show up, but more importantly step up—give the temple a few hours a month, ask what needs doing instead of waiting to be asked, and, if you are asked to help, say "Yes. I can handle that."

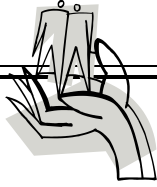

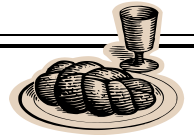
